

Questions/Policies for Consultation Day

How many homes?

Uttlesford is expected to provide a total of 14,100 homes between the period 2011 to 2033. Stansted has already committed to providing approximately 50 homes at Elms Farm and 150 homes at Walpole Farm and is not expected to have many more than this within the period of the new Local Plan.

Allocating housing numbers across the district is the responsibility of Uttlesford District Council and our Neighbourhood Plan has to be in conformity with the Uttlesford Local Plan. We could, however, decide to accept MORE development than in the Local Plan which could bring further benefits by providing much-needed infrastructure.

We need to know, however, how much housing has been allocated to villages such as Stansted before making any decision on this.

The potential sites for new housing in Stansted Mountfitchet have been identified in the map below:

We cannot see, however, the village being capable of further expansion without a detrimental impact on its heritage and character.



Business & Local Economy

Stansted is well located and not only serves local residents but also those working at the airport as well as tourists visiting the Castle and the Toy Museum. It also has a thriving business community with over 600 businesses located in the Parish.

Education

Stansted Mountfitchet has two primary schools and a third, the Magna Carta school, expected to open in the near future. Whilst provision for Primary and junior school aged children is good, there may still be a need for more nursery places and there is currently no Sixth form education in the village. Although at one time there was adult education available, this facility was closed due to lack of support.

Health

Chapter 8 of the National Planning Policy Framework (2012) acknowledges that the planning system can play an important role in facilitating social interaction and creating healthy, inclusive communities. Local planning authorities should create a shared vision with communities of the residential environment and facilities they wish to see. To support this, local planning authorities should aim to involve all sections of the community in the development of Local Plans and in planning decisions, and should facilitate Neighbourhood planning. Planning policies and decisions, in turn, should aim to achieve places which promote health and wellbeing.

Transport

Our vision for Stansted Mountfitchet in terms of transport is to improve ease and safety for pedestrians (including those with restricted mobility) and cyclists. We would like to reduce, if possible, the use of cars but our overall aim is to facilitate the flow of traffic through the village.

Green Infrastructure

Green spaces are the 'green lungs' of our communities which contribute to improving people's physical and mental health by providing places for informal recreation - walking, cycling, sitting, socialising and children's play. Green spaces also create safe and attractive places where people want to live and businesses invest. Uttlesford has the least amount of accessible green space in Essex and its housing density policies mean that most new developments provide only the smallest gardens and little community green space.

Green infrastructure includes:

- Parks and gardens
- Green corridors
- Amenity green space
- Cemeteries

- Natural and semi-natural urban green spaces
- Outdoor sports facilities
- Allotments, community gardens and city farms
- Accessible countryside in urban fringe areas
